FACT

A fact is information that can be checked in a reliable source, such as a text, chart, map, or record.

A triangle has three sides.

REASONED JUDGMENT

A reasoned judgment is a conclusion or recommendation based on facts. It may need more evidence before it is fully confirmed.

Because insulated windows reduce heat loss, installing them could lower a building's heating costs.

3	Because nitrate levels rose downstream from the factory, the discharge should be investigated as a possible source.	JUDGMENT	This recommendation uses evidence but does not claim the factory is proven to be the source.
4	The map key shows that blue lines mark rivers.	FACT	This can be checked directly in the map key.
5	The timeline places the treaty in 1848.	FACT	This is a checkable detail from a timeline.
6	The graph shows a 15 percent drop in electricity use from May to June.	FACT	This is a checkable claim about graph data.

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **FACT:** The Pacific Ocean is the largest ocean on Earth.
- **JUDGMENT:** Because the report shows fewer crashes after the speed limit changed, the city should study whether the change improved safety.

Challenge: For item 2, ridership counts by time of day could strengthen the claim if many students need transportation before school, or weaken it if few students need that route.

Facts are checkable details from a source or visual. Reasoned judgments draw a conclusion, prediction, or recommendation from evidence and may require additional evidence to confirm them.
