HYPERBOLE

Hyperbole uses an extreme exaggeration that is not meant literally. It emphasizes a strong feeling or situation.

"My phone rang a million times during breakfast."

UNDERSTATEMENT

Understatement makes a serious, large, or intense situation sound smaller or less important. It can create a calm, dry, or humorous tone.

After fireworks shook the windows, Nia muttered, "That was slightly noisy."

PART 3 • MAKE YOUR OWN (SAMPLE ANSWERS)

- **HYPERBOLE:** "The violinist's solo lasted forever."
- **UNDERSTATE:** Understatement: After the power outage darkened the auditorium, Omar remarked, "The lights are a little dim."

Challenge: When the final bell rang, the crowd thundered loudly enough to shake the planet. Ms. Chen smiled at the packed hallway and said, "It is a little busy." The hyperbole means the crowd was extremely loud and creates an excited tone. The understatement means the hallway was very crowded and creates a dry, calm tone.

Accept equivalent student examples when the wording clearly exaggerates or clearly minimizes the situation. For the challenge, students should identify both the intended meaning and the tone created by each device.
