HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Read each prompt aloud and give students time to mark their page. Have students turn the paper slightly before beginning, then ask them to explain their choices by talking about corners, straight sides, or a curved edge. Listen for students to keep the same shape name after the page is turned.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • CIRCLE IT

SAY “Shapes can keep the same name when you turn your paper. For each row, listen to my question, circle one shape, and then tell how its sides, corners, or curved edge helped you know.”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Which shape is a circle? Circle it. What do you notice about its edge?	circle
b	Which shape is a square? Circle it. How many corners do you see?	square
c	Which shape is a rectangle? Circle it. What do you notice about its sides?	rectangle

PART 2 • MATCH SHAPES

SAY “Look at the shapes on the left. I will read the shape words on the right. Draw a line from each shape to its name. How do the sides and corners help you decide?”

- **triangle** matches **triangle**
- **circle** matches **circle**
- **rectangle** matches **rectangle**

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Accept the marked circle row answers as circle, square, and rectangle in that order. For matching, accept triangle to triangle, circle to circle, and rectangle to rectangle; accept oral reasoning that mentions corners, straight sides, or a curved edge.
