HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

First, fold a blank paper square into 2 matching parts and then into 4 matching parts, using examples different from the stories on this page. Read each prompt aloud, and have students circle a word or dot group to show the name of an equal share or the number in one equal share.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • NAME IT

SAY “Listen to each share story. I will read the three words in each row, then circle the word that answers the question.”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Two children share one whole sandwich. It is cut into 2 same-size pieces. Which word names each piece: halves, fourths, or equal?	halves
b	Four children share one whole pizza. It is cut into 4 same-size pieces. Which word names each piece: halves, fourths, or equal?	fourths
c	Four children share one whole cake. It is cut into 4 same-size pieces. Which word means same size: halves, equal, or fourths?	equal

PART 2 • SHARE DOTS

SAY “Listen to each fair-sharing story. I will count the dot groups in the row, then circle the dots that show how many items one child gets.”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	Two children share 2 crackers fairly. The dot groups show two, one, and four. Which dot group shows how many crackers each child gets?	1 dots
b	Two children share 4 grapes fairly. The dot groups show one, four, and two. Which dot group shows how many grapes each child gets?	2 dots
c	Four children share 4 berries fairly. The dot groups show four, one, and two. Which dot group shows how many berries each child gets?	1 dots

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Name It answers are halves, fourths, and equal. Share Dots answers are 1 dot, 2 dots, and 1 dot; accept a clear circle around the correct cell.
