SWITCHING LENGTH UNITS

Use these facts: 1 foot = 12 inches and 1 yard = 3 feet. One yard also equals 36 inches. Multiply when you change to a smaller unit, and divide when you change to a larger unit.

WORKED EXAMPLE

How many inches are in 5 feet?

1. 1 foot = 12 inches.

2. Multiply 5×12 .

3. $5 \times 12 = 60$.

Answer: 60 inches
