CHANCE WORDS

An outcome is what happens in a chance event. Use impossible when it cannot happen and certain when it must happen. If an outcome is less than half likely, say unlikely, exactly half likely, say equally likely, and more than half likely, say likely.

WORKED EXAMPLE

A box has 13 red pencils and 14 blue pencils. Describe the chance of picking a blue pencil without looking.

1. Count all pencils: $13 + 14 = 27$.
2. Blue pencils make up 14 of the 27 pencils.
3. Since 14 is more than half of 27, picking blue is likely.

Answer: likely

Then label each outcome with impossible, unlikely, equally likely, likely, or certain.

PART 2 • APPLY IT

1. **likely** There are 12 bookmarks in all. Since 9 of the 12 bookmarks are fantasy, picking a fantasy bookmark is more than half likely.
2. **equally likely** Half of the spaces, 6 out of 12, show gems. Landing on a gem is exactly half likely.

CHALLENGE

robot, star, planet, rocket. Drawing a robot is impossible, drawing a star is unlikely, drawing a planet is unlikely, and drawing a rocket is equally likely.

Accept the listed probability terms and equivalent phrases such as "no chance" for impossible and "even chance" for equally likely. Likely means more than one half, and unlikely means less than one half.
