HOW TO RUN THIS PAGE

Read each prompt aloud and have students mark the page as they listen. The skill is shown when a student helps pose a question for a group of 20 children that collects answers in a named set of three categories.

Students never read directions on this sheet. Read each part's script aloud, then each prompt, giving think time before students mark.

PART 1 • PICK A WORD

SAY “We are planning questions for 20 children. Listen to each question with a blank, then circle the big word that makes a question about the choices you hear.”

ROW	SAY	STUDENTS CIRCLE
a	We will ask children to choose circle, square, or triangle. Which blank do you like best? The words are Shape, Letter, Number. Which word makes our question?	Shape
b	We will ask children to choose A, B, or C. Which blank do you like best? The words are Number, Shape, Letter. Which word makes our question?	Letter
c	We will ask children to choose sun, map, or pig. Which blank do you like best? The words are Letter, Number, Word. Which word makes our question?	Word

PART 2 • ASK IT

SAY “We will ask 20 children these questions. For each box, say the question with me, including the three choices I say, then trace the gray word. For Shape, ask about circle, square, and triangle. For Letter, ask about A, B, and C.”

- Box 1 (beside Shape): **shape**
- Box 2 (beside Letter): **letter**

WHAT TO ACCEPT

Part 1 answers are Shape, Letter, Word. In Part 2, accept a traced or copied topic word and oral questions that ask which shape or letter a child likes best and include the three stated choices.
